Campaign Update

The 2012 election was a show of force by women, who this year represented 53 percent of the electorate. The millennials, voters under the age of 29, increased their 12 percent share in 2010 to 19 percent of all voters this year. AAUW can be proud of its Action Fund's *It's My Vote: I Will Be Heard* Campaign, which represented an unprecedented investment in making women's voices heard in the election and engaging millennial women to create lifelong voting habits.

This year's election has sent a record number of women to Congress. There will now be twenty women serving in the Senate and eighty-one women in the House of Representatives. New Hampshire provided another election highlight by becoming the first state with a woman governor and an all-female Congressional Delegation.

In a recap of the election results, AAUW President, Carolyn Garfein, observes, "Although our work to advance education and equity for women and girls is far from over, today we can sit back and give ourselves a pat on the back for a job well done....Thank you to the AAUW members and branches that got creative and inspired everyone around them with their passion."

AAUW Public Policy Positions

AAUW's mission is to promote and protect education, civil rights, and women's rights. It will continue to fight for fair pay and promote women's health issues and will closely follow the student financial aid changes expected in the 2013-2014 academic year.

AAUW supports a **balanced** approach to prevent our country falling off the fiscal cliff. If sequestration (automatic spending cuts) occurs, there will be massive funding cuts for education, women's health, and civil rights, unless it is applied equally to both defense and discretionary spending.

Amanda Holt, a citizen advocate, spoke on Pennsylvania's legislative redistricting plan at the November AAUW East District meeting. AAUW-Bethlehem members, who attended included Randi Blauth, Bernie Gardiner, and Ruth Skoglund.

Student Affiliate Activities

The AAUW Student Affiliate Group (SAG) has been busy. We've concluded a great few months of energizing our campus about the election, we've begun to collaborate with other campus groups for a major future event, and we've co-sponsored and contributed to various projects on campus that correspond with our goals of empowering women and educating about women's issues.

After working to get students registered to vote, our efforts culminated on Election Day. We decorated the campus in red, white, and blue. On Election Day we hosted a voting table at which we handed out information, directed voters who were registered on campus to their polling place, and provided refreshments. One of our members, Tom Lazaro, dressed up as Uncle Sam. He was a huge hit and also got great press for our group! We hosted an election watch party that night open to the whole campus, at which we finally took a moment to exhale and took pride in the excitement that our efforts generated on campus.

Another event that we hope raises awareness is the STEM program that we will co-host next semester. We have already begun to collaborate on this event with other student groups including the ACM-W (Women's Association for Computing Machinery), the Brain Club, and the Art Club. We will invite Girl Scout troops within the region to the all-day program, focused on STEM issues. The day will include a leadership and self-esteem workshop led by our members, who attended this summer's NCCWSL conference.

In addition to our own activities, we have sponsored and contributed to other campus programs. One that was especially successful was a presentation on November 5 by Planned Parenthood's Heather Schumaker about how the election would effect Planned Parenthood and women's health. The event was hosted and organized by one of Dr. Zaremba's students, Molly Rambo, and sponsored by the Student Affiliate Group. Some of our members, including Kate Cohen, Melissa Walters, Tom, and myself will be contributing to the *Estrogen Bomb* on our college radio station, WRMC, on November 16. The *Estrogen Bomb* is an all-day radio broadcast, hosted by Dr. Zaremba's student, Corrin Magditch, with the mission to "educate, empower, and discuss issues revolving around women and feminism."

We have more great programs and events already planned for the future. In the immediate future, we plan to host a two-week drive on campus to collect baby items for the Nurse-Family Partnership. We will be sending out all-campus e-mails to make people aware of the drive, and we will be sitting in the college's HUB every day during the second week handing out information and asking people to contribute. We are especially excited about what is on the horizon. Next semester will include two of our biggest events: Take Back the Night and Pay Equity Day.

Bus Trip Scheduled - May 11, 2013 Barnes Foundation and Rodin Museum in Philadelphia

Philadelphia is known as a cultural Mecca, but its reputation is burning even more brightly with the opening of the Barnes Foundation and the renovations to the Rodin Museum, both along the Benjamin Franklin Parkway. **Make your reservation now** for the Saturday, May 11, 2013 day-long outing.

The bus leaves from Enzo Travel, 3320 Airport Road at 8 am. First stop is the Barnes Foundation, a world-renown collection of Impressionist and post-Impressionist paintings and objects. We will pick up audio guides and proceed through the galleries at our own pace. Save time to visit their exquisite gift shop, before leaving at noon. Our driver will drop us off in Old City for lunch on our own - a list of restaurants will be handed out. At 2 pm we re-board our motor coach for a 2:30 pm reservation at the Rodin Museum. Our one-hour guided tour allows us time to concentrate on galleries of interest before leaving at 4:15 pm. We return to Bethlehem at approximately 6 pm.

Cost is \$75 per person. Cost includes museum admissions, bus transportation, and driver gratuity. MEMBER-ONLY reservations will be accepted until December 15. (Do not wait; reservations to the Barnes are hard to get. Bus seats will be assigned in the order of checks received). If there are seats after December 15, reservations will be open to family members and friends. After January 1, 2013, reservations will open to the public.



- First Asian woman to serve in Congress, first openly gay senator to serve
- Both parties spoke to women's issues

Congress is closer to reflecting the diversity of our country. The AAUW Mission Statement reminds us of our commitment to diversity every day. Our branch, and its Get Out the Vote partners, should be proud of its contribution to our community, state, and country.

Thank you to all the members who took part in AAUW's yearlong *It's My Vote: I Will Be Heard* campaign! The campaign kicked into high gear the month before the election as we continued to educate women voters. AAUW states and branches nationwide made reminder calls to millennial women in their communities, while others canvassed door to door. The AAUW Action Fund is proud to note that women turned out to vote in droves, making up 53% of the electorate, and young people exceeded their record turnout from 2008.

113th Congress Faces Pressure on Agreements on K-12 Education

Representative John Kline (R-MN), who remains chair of the House Education and the Workforce Committee, predicts that pressure to do more will elicit bipartisan agreements on K-12 education. U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan will likely have a second term, in which he will face five key, and contested, issues in a Congress that remains divided: No Child Left Behind waivers, Race to the Top grant program, No Child Left Behind reauthorization, education budget cuts, and balancing support and opposition for a “common core” national curriculum. AAUW believes that quality public education is the foundation of a democratic society. We advocate an equitable, bias-free public education system and responsible funding for all levels of education. AAUW will work to reauthorize and improve the Elementary and Secondary Education Act; pursue programs aimed at closing the achievement gap and increasing access to higher education; prevent the expansion of vouchers; and fight to protect and enforce Title IX.

Spelman College to Replace Athletic Program

Spelman College, a historically black women's college in Atlanta, announced that it will end its athletic program to focus on wellness programs. Spelman spends about \$1 million on sports, but only 4% of students participate in athletics. The college will now spend that money on new health and fitness initiatives, such as improving fitness facilities, that it says will benefit all 2,100 students attending the school.
