Women in the White House in JFK's Administration

While this issue of the Bylines is “going to press,” our country is commemorating and remembering the death of President John F. Kennedy in November 1963. As part of that process, we should take time to consider the role of women in the Kennedy administration, a phenomenon which is not widely known or recognized. In fact, Kennedy was a politician who keenly understood the growing importance of women in the workplace. After decades when women were told their place was only in the home, two-thirds of Kennedy’s White House staff were women. They wrote letters for the President, coordinated media coverage, and helped to create new government agencies. One of them, Mary Ann Orlando, participated in the creation of the Peace Corps. Another, Jean Lewis, was in charge of all logistics for key political events such as the Democratic National Convention in Los Angeles in 1960. Of eight staffers in the Press Office, five were women. It is true that none of them were named to top level positions as heads of the agencies they served, and true too that they were often relegated to the basement for lunch while the men dined in the White House dining room. But, still, they were the forerunners of women in government and business in the United States.

It was President Kennedy who created the first and only Presidential Commission on the Status of Women, chaired by none other than Eleanor Roosevelt. Kennedy foresaw increasing numbers of women entering the workforce, and he stated, “This is a matter of great national concern, and in this great society of ours we want to be sure that women are used as effectively as they can [be] to provide a better life for our people, in addition to meeting their primary responsibility which is in the home.” His words gave lip service to the traditional view of women as only homemakers, but at the same time he nudged the country to consider how the talents of women could be expressed in the public sphere.

Fifty years later, we look back on Kennedy’s Commission on the Status of Women and consider it to have been remarkably progressive. Indeed, the report it issued helped to pave the way for the women’s movement. The commission’s recommendations included such matters as guaranteed paid maternity leave and subsidized day care, neither of which have come to fruition yet in our own time. Clearly, we still have much work to do to achieve full equality and parity in the workplace. Yet we can thank those women who broke out of the mold fifty years ago and created new possibilities for all of us to build upon.

How can you, your daughters, granddaughters and other women you know get help achieving their dreams?

AAUW knows that educational opportunity can provide women with a lifetime of success. That is why AAUW maintains and promotes an Educational Opportunities Fund. What is achieved through the fund?

Fellowships and grants are awarded including for those for specific projects, career development, community action and for selected professions.

The Fellows Alumnae Initiative is a network women can access to connect with other women who have been past or who are present recipients of AAUW grants and fellowships.

Weeklong camps, called AAUW Trek, which provide inspiration for 8th-grade girls in science, technology, engineering. And math career possibilities.

For example, career development grants support women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance their careers, change careers, or re-enter the work force. Special consideration is given to women of color, and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields.

Grants provide support for course work beyond a bachelor's degree, including a master's degree, second bachelor's degree, or specialized training in technical or professional fields. Funds are available for distance learning. Course work must be taken at an accredited two- or four-year college or university in the United States, or at a technical school that is fully licensed or accredited by the U.S. Department of Education. 

Senate: Filibuster Change

There's been a lot of hype around the Senate's action to adjust its rules for considering judicial and executive nominations. As usual, AAUW is here to cut through the hype and break down what this change means for women and girls. First, a little bit of background: In U.S. history, Congress has filibustered (i.e. blocked a confirmation vote of) only 168 presidential nominees. An astonishing 82 of those nominees have been filibustered in the last four years, including three qualified women recently nominated for the DC Circuit Court and subsequently filibustered. What yesterday's rules change means is that frustrating gridlock is over. Starting with nominee Patricia Millett, the Senate will be able to give D.C. Circuit nominees, and most other presidential nominees, an up-or-down vote. We are hopeful that the confirmation process is back on track, and we will continue to encourage the Senate to end obstructionism on nominees as well as critical legislation. Thank you to the thousands of AAUW members who have consistently urged the Senate to confirm nominees in a timely manner. With your help, we can continue our efforts to give judicial nominees the up-or-down votes they deserve.

Women Hit Workforce Milestone

A recent Department of Labor report showed a record 67.5 million working women, beating the 2008 pre-recession record of 67.4 million. While women have gained back the jobs lost during the recession, the overall employment gains for women have not kept pace with population growth and the gender wage gap persists in many of these professions.

State Spotlight: Connecticut

We applaud the leadership of Gov. Dannel Malloy (D-CT) in commissioning a nine-month study and pay equity report released recently. The report cited AAUW's research on the gender pay gap and recommended many of the policies for which AAUW advocates, including policies that allow workers to discuss wages and programs that encourage girls to consider science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) fields.

Progress: Women in the Military

Congratulations to the three women who became the first female graduates of the Marine Corps Infantry training course! These ladies performed the same exercises as men over a 59-day training camp. Although the women will not join infantry units while the Armed Forces continues to study how to lift the combat ban for women, this graduation ceremony still represents a significant crack in the military glass ceiling.
