President's Message from Susan McNamara

For many of us in AAUW-Bethlehem, October has been a month of travel. For some the trips have been made via autos and/or planes to distant lands or continents. For others of us, the journeys this month have come by means of video, power point presentations or talks.

On October 11, a full audience of members and guests went to Nepal via Myra Jones' filmed missionary trip travelogue. Learning about the daily lives of women and girls in this still largely patriarchal society and about educational efforts supported by the Moravian Church was a highlight of this journey.

On October 22, we joined with members from eleven other branches for an AAUW-PA District East meeting at Northampton Community College. With the promise of a panel presentation on the 'hot' public policy issue, of Marcellus Shale, members were joined by friends, spouses, and other interested community folks. Beginning with the geological perspective offered by Dr. Dru Germanoski of Lafayette College, we traveled below the earth's surface to its substructures and back in time thru many geologically formative eras and events that make up the history and biography of Marcellus Shale. We went upstate to the town of Towanda, Bradford County, presently the heart of drilling territory in the Northeast of PA for a 'bird's eye view' of the impact on the landscape, economy, and culture of the community with AAUW member, Towanda resident, and Chesapeake Energy Corporation Community Advisory Board leader Joyce Kerrick. Tracey Carluccio, Deputy Director of Delaware RiverKeeper Network, took us back in time to the age of the Industrial Revolution, dawning and dying, for an understanding of the potential impact of the era of shale drilling on the Delaware River. Finally, we travelled to Harrisburg to learn from AAUW member and State Senator Lisa Boscola about the status of legislative efforts to address shale drilling fiscal and environmental issues.

While we certainly didn't carry away any typical tourist souvenirs from our visit, we definitely left with an understanding about Marcellus Shale that is both much broader and deeper than that which most of us had before this meeting. Many were surprised to learn, for example, that from a geologist's perspective, concern about destruction of aquifers from drilling is largely misplaced (reports of incidents of flaming tap water produced by methane gases from a variety of sources have long pre-dated shale fracking). Most were unaware that gas companies have created citizen advisory boards and hold regular town meetings in affected communities. Eye-opening as well was the consensus among panelists that the most serious concerns about Marcellus Shale drilling relate to the issue of scope; that is, the risks to landscapes, rivers and streams, water and food, community cultures and economic well-being consequent from an exponential increase in the number of drilling activities, wells, pipelines.

What's Happening?

President Obama has launched an initiative to encourage women in the pursuit of education and careers in math and science. He also invited three American women to the Oval Office to honor them for their participation in the Google Science Fair. These women won the top places in the Google Science Fair. Their work included treatment for ovarian cancer for women who had developed immunity to chemotherapy treatment, improving living conditions to prevent asthma attacks and to alleviate symptoms in the home and the potential connection between carcinogen-producing marinades and grilled chicken. The women were ages 16 and 17 years.

Three women won the 2011 Nobel Peace Prize for work that sparked reform in Liberia and Yemen.

Believe it or not! A 96-year old woman was denied a voter ID card in Tennessee because she couldn't produce a marriage license. This law requiring proof of a change in name, as in marriage, will be enforced in several states in the 2012 election. The woman had a birth certificate and a voter registration card when she applied for the ID card. She also had a copy of her lease and proof of rent payments.

Occupy Wall Street: The 99% Group asserts "no true democracy is attainable when the process is determined by economic power". The group urges Americans to use their right of assembly to protest corporations' use of economic wealth to influence the political process.

AAUW supports Obama's Job Creation Bill (on the AAUW Website) and encourages advocating on behalf of workers and students for pay equity, earned sick days, student debt reduction and improved working conditions.



Social Security Bill in the House

Please urge your representative in the House of Representatives to cosponsor a bill that would close Social Security's funding gap by lifting the cap on payroll taxed for Social Security purposes. Today, 94% of Americans pay into Social Security on the basis of their whole salary - but the wealthiest 6% do not. Because the cap for individual income stands at \$106,800, someone who makes that much pays exactly the same amount into Social Security as someone making two million dollars.

The *No Loopholes in Social Security Taxes Act* (H.R. 797) would gradually lift the cap so that by 2033, the wealthiest 6% of Americans will be on equal footing with everyone else. This plan would extend the full solvency of Social Security for the next 75 years, ensuring that the program continues to help provide retirement security for future generations.

FBI Moves to Broaden the Definition of Rape

An FBI subcommittee announced that the definition of rape used by the agency should be replaced with a broader, more accurate, definition. The subcommittee recommends the new definition include anal and oral rape, as well as rapes involving male victims. The current definition, written 80 years ago, only includes sexual assaults that involve force and vaginal penetration and has been criticized as being too narrow, resulting in the exclusion of thousands of rapes from the FBI's annual Uniform Crime Report. The proposal is subject to approval of the full advisory board in December. AAUW supports the FBI's proposal to update the definition of rape.

We left as well with panelists' suggestions about measures for addressing the concerns including: a moratorium on drilling permits to allow for essential impact analyses and recommendations; strengthened regulations; adequate financing DEP and especially for support of the staff adequate to meet the health and safety demands posed. Asked about citizen action, panelists suggested calling to legislators NOW, signing a Riverkeeper petition on the moratorium and/or attending a Delaware River Basin Commission Hearing on November 21 as options.

In the afternoon, we turned attention to matters primarily AAUW - national, state, and district: news from the National Convention in June, membership incentives, the SAVE-U petition, the AAUW-PA Public Policy Grant funded ad campaign in support of increasing voter registration for 18-35 year-old women, 2014 AAUW-PA office nominations, and the April 13-15 Convention.

With packets of hand-outs and notes in hand, this day's travelers were sent off with a few snapshots of initiatives and perspectives that might whet branch appetite for more venturing out at home: Lansdale's STEM project, awarded recognition at National Convention, as a model; a film event featuring the Miss-representation DVD to be shared throughout the District; the e-book discussion group; the Archive project; networking on Facebook and friending AAUW-PA; and Ten Reasons AAUW is Important to a young professional.

October certainly has been a month rich in programs that extend our informational frameworks and exercise our thinking muscles. It seems perfect timing, then, to have scheduled for November a program in which we will be stretching our bodies as we learn about and try out Tai Chi. Plan to join us!

Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School New AAUW Report Due Out November 2011

Based on findings from a nationally representative survey in May and June 2011, this report presents the most comprehensive research to date on sexual harassment in grades 7 through 12. and reveals some sobering statistics about the presence of sexual harassment and the negative impact it has on students' education.

The report concludes with concrete recommendations and promising practices for preventing sexual harassment directed at school administrators, educators, students, parents, and community members.

AAUW has been at the forefront of research on sexual harassment for more than a decade starting with the 1993 *Hostile Hallways* survey and the 2001 follow up *Hostile Hallways report: Bullying, Teasing, and Sexual Harassment in School*. A PDF copy of the new report can be ordered at www.AAUW.org.

Louisiana School Board Halts Single Sex Classes

The Vermilion Parish, LA school board agreed to end a middle school program that segregated core curricular classes by sex. The decision is part of a settlement between the Vermilion Parish School Board and clients represented by the American Civil Liberties Union and the ACLU of Louisiana. The school board agreed not to institute sex-segregated programs at any of the 19 schools in Vermilion Parish through the 2016-2017 school year. The lawsuit said that the program at a middle school in Kaplan, LA, violated Title IX and the Equal Protection clause of the Constitution.

AAUW believes single-sex education without proper attention to civil rights protections can reinforce problematic gender stereotypes, increase discrimination, and restrict the educational opportunities open to both girls and boys. Even where separate programs are established, they have tended to be distinctly unequal, with fewer resources allocated for girls programs. As a result, both the Constitution and Title IX have placed limits on the availability of single-sex education, while at the same time explicitly allowing for single-sex programs that are carefully constructed to remedy existing or past discrimination. AAUW believes policies and reforms that allow women and men to excel are beneficial for society as a whole.
