Getting Even: Women and the Wage Gap Founder of WAGE Project to Speak March 18

A woman graduating from college this spring will make \$1M less than a man who graduated with her unless she acts to make sure she is paid

fairly.

Evelyn Murphy, former Lt. Governor of Massachusetts, is our Branch's major speaker for Pay Equity in 2014.

Because of the wage gap, more women than men experience poverty, or teeter right on the edge. They are missing almost a quarter of their rightful earnings—money that few women can afford to miss. Eleven million older American women (and only four million older men) make do with less than \$8,300 a year, the federal definition of poverty. Nearly three times as many women as men live at subsistence level in their old age. The wage gap isn't some meaningless

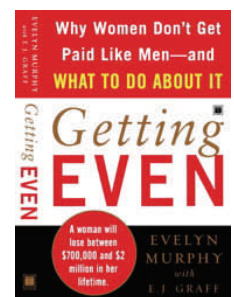
abstraction. It adds up. Discrimination is costing women (and their loved ones) the paychecks, pensions, and security that they need and deserve.

Evelyn Murphy is founder and President of The WAGE Project, Inc, a nationwide, grassroots, action-oriented organizations dedicated to eliminating the gender wage gap by getting women paid fairly.

She will give her audience a look at the tools and techniques to be comfortable, confident and committed to getting paid what they are worth. Bring your neighbor, sister, grandchildren, and anyone who interacts with young people. Her appearance is funded in part by an Arts and Lecture Grant from Moravian College.

Ms. Murphy will meet with a small student group prior to her talk.

AAUW Public Policy Items

From Lisa Maatz, AAUW's Vice President of Government relations: "In February, AAUW members held a lobby day in Virginia, launched a video campaign in Colorado, sent thousands of messages to Congress, held a forum with your member of Congress, wrote [letters to the editor](#), and served your communities and AAUW in so many other uncountable ways."

President Obama announced the creation of a White House Task Force on Campus Sexual Assault, to be included in the updated Violence Against Women Act (VAWA).

The first [Athena List](#) – a feminist parallel to the Black List, which recognizes high quality scripts that have yet to become movies – premiered at the Athena Film Festival happening now in New York City. The Athena List recognizes four unproduced screenplays that feature a female protagonist lead, including one about AAUW's Lilly Ledbetter.

The West Virginia House [passed](#) the Pregnant Workers' Fairness Act in early February. The Act allows pregnant employees to request reasonable accommodations such as an accessible worksite and modified duties or hours. It also prohibits employers from rejecting qualified job applicants solely because those applicants would need those accommodations. Advocates are optimistic the bill will pass the state Senate.

The West Virginia House [passed](#) the Pregnant Workers' Fairness Act this week. The Act allows pregnant employees to request reasonable accommodations such as an accessible worksite and modified duties or hours. It also prohibits employers from rejecting qualified job applicants solely because those applicants would need those accommodations. Advocates are optimistic the bill will pass the state Senate.

February 26, the New Hampshire State House passed a state-level Paycheck Fairness Act (HB 1188). The bill would strengthen the state's current pay discrimination law and prohibit retaliation against workers who ask about or share salary information. The bill will now proceed to the New Hampshire State Senate for consideration.

50 Boston businesses have signed on to "100% Talent: The Boston Women's Compact," an [initiative](#) that encourages business to self-assess their pay practices and choose strategies to address gaps. Every two years, the companies' results will be compiled to assess progress toward equal pay.

AAUW testified in support of the District of Columbia's proposed Title IX Athletic Equity Act. The act would help close opportunity gaps in D.C. high schools by requiring schools to disclose student athlete participation rates and how much they spend on sports for male and female students. AAUW continues to advocate at the federal level for a [similar bill](#) that would affect high schools nationwide.

Member in the News

In February, member Stephanie Hnatiw, executive director of the YWCA of Bethlehem, had her story highlighted by AAUW-National. Here it is from National's website:

"I'm the mother of a daughter with severe disabilities. My daughter, Raisa, is 26 years old and in a wheelchair. She can't talk, and one of the disorders she struggles with is cluster seizures. If she has a bad seizure in the morning, she can't go to her adult day program, which means someone has to stay home to care for her. My husband and I both work full-time jobs. My job is at a small nonprofit organization of less than 50 people, so I am not eligible for leave under the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA). For years throughout my career, I've had to use my vacation days to care for Raisa if she was having seizures. Fortunately, my husband works for a large business that is covered by FMLA, so he has been able to split some of the care giving with me. But even then, the leave he takes to care for our daughter is unpaid, which means our family is taking a hit every time he stays home. We're just trying to be good parents — why are the laws in our country making that so difficult?" Stephanie's story is why AAUW supports the Family and Medical Insurance Leave Act, which creates a national insurance program funded by employee and employer contributions. The Act would provide eligible employees with up to 12 weeks of paid leave to care for situations such as their own serious illness, the serious illness of a child, parent or spouse (including a domestic partner), and the birth or adoption of a child. Employees who work full time at small organizations like Stephanie's nonprofit would be covered, and the program would be funded by employee and employer contributions that would amount to less than \$1.50 per week for the average worker.

It is most fitting that AAUW has a fund named after Eleanor Roosevelt. The great humanitarian was a supporter of AAUW and embodied its values of human rights and empowerment and education for women. In the mid-1950s she participated in an AAUW national convention.



Founded in 1989, the fund makes possible research to provide analysis, data, and information about issues that are important to women and to our society as a whole. The resulting reports have garnered national attention, generated much discussion and been used as the basis for positive change. Recent reports include *Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, and Mathematics* (2010), *Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School* (2011) *The Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap* (2012), and *Graduating to a Pay Gap* (2013).

Additionally, the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund Award is given annually to an individual, project, organization, or institution for outstanding contributions to equality and education for women and girls. Activities include classroom teaching, education and research, and legal and legislative work. The most recent recipient of this award is Linda T. Alepin, the founder of the Global Women's Leadership Network, which provides leadership training for women and coaching through a national network.

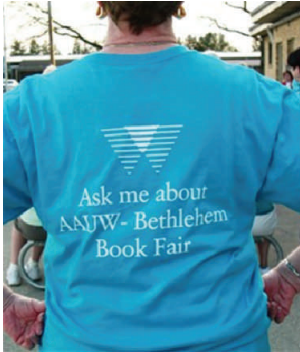
Violence Against Women Panel at Lehigh University

AAUW-Bethlehem: Nominating Report Candidates for Elected Officers

President: Ruth Skoglund: I grew up on Chicago's south side near the University of Chicago, attended Grinnell College, a small liberal arts school in Iowa, and taught English for a year in Thessaloniki, Greece as part of Grinnell's Fifth Year Abroad program. After that enriching experience, I embarked on a Master's program at the U. of C. in English and History and became a high school teacher in Chicago during some of the most turbulent years of the 1960s when gang warfare erupted regularly, and civil rights issues prompted walk-outs and confrontations. Eventually, I left the front lines of urban education for a job teaching reading comprehension to adults returning to school. I married and had two wonderful children, and in 1980 the family moved to Lansdale PA for my then-husband's work.



Those were turbulent times, as my marriage fell apart, and I realized that I was not cut out for classroom teaching. My thoughts turned to the law, and I remembered that I had been afraid to consider applying to law school after college because at that time it was not a career that many women undertook. Now it became a challenge that I could not resist, which led to attending law school at Temple University and embarking on a second career. For 14 years I commuted from Lansdale to a law practice in Allentown until I moved to the Lehigh Valley and could spend the next 8 years commuting 10 minutes to work. I now wonder how the family managed during those years, but we did. I was surely inspired by the many women world-wide who have found creative ways to juggle the demands of parenting, homemaking and work.

In retirement, I have found challenging volunteer opportunities in the ESL field and currently as a court advocate with Turning Point of the Lehigh Valley. I am active in AAUW, serving on several committees and as Diversity Chair. From my association with AAUW members, I have learned what a huge difference a spirited and determined group of women can make. Together I hope that we can build on the wonderful work that has been done by our Branch to promote education and equity for women and girls. We are part of a wave of women who are becoming increasingly empowered to take on greater roles in our community and country. It's an exciting time to be a woman and to be part of AAUW-Bethlehem.

Cathy Kotanchik: President Elect: I earned my bachelor of arts degree from Emory University in Atlanta and my master of arts from Kings College, University of London. When our daughters were in pre-school, Bob and I moved to England for ten years. After ten years back in Pennsylvania, and when the girls were both in graduate school, Sperry, which became Unysis, sent us to Europe again. This time we spent five years in Brussels where I was



on the Board of the American Women's Club of Brussels and co-editor of their monthly magazine, *Rendez-vous*. We moved to East Allen Township twelve years ago and I joined Weichert Closing Services, its title company. I handle the SE Pennsylvania title work for Weichert Workforce Mobility, Inc. I became active with AAUW-Bethlehem and I discovered a focus for my passion for empowering women and girls to achieve equality in every aspect of their lives. Although the Equal Rights Amendment has not passed in the necessary number of states to be ratified, the efforts of women in organizations like ours continue to change the mentality of Americans towards the wisdom of equality.

Co-Vice-President, Programs: Stacey Zaremba: Stacey is a Full Professor at Moravian College. She teaches classes in Psychology and Women's Studies and holds a Ph.D. from Fordham University in Experimental Psychology. Stacey serves on the Board of Directors of the YWCA of Bethlehem. She is the Faculty Advisor to the Moravian College AAUW Student Affiliate group. She is also a board member of the Eastern Psychological Association. Stacey's passion is activism; she works with her students to move people from "thinking the good" to "doing the good," which creates a more just and caring world. Stacey received the 2010 Outstanding Breast Cancer Survivor award from the Philadelphia Affiliate of the Susan G. Komen for the Cure. In 2011, she was recognized as YWCA's Volunteer of the Year. Stacey also received The Timothy M. Breidegam Memorial Faculty and Administrators Award for unselfishly giving her service to the Moravian College community and the Lindback Award for Distinguished Teaching. Stacey received the 2013 Faculty Advisor Award for her work with the student affiliate group and it was the same year that the group won the Omicron Delta Kappa Organization of the year. The mission of AAUW is consistent with Stacey's passions and near and dear to her heart. Her work with the student affiliates, the diversity group, and the many subcommittees she has served on continues to keep her engaged in the work of AAUW.

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The Race Card Project

January 30, Bethlehem and Easton branch members heard Michele Norris of NPR at Zoellner Arts Center, Lehigh University. Her memoir, *The Grace of Silence*, is about her family history, relationships, and the silences between family members. She started The Race Card Project, which asks people around the world to distill their thoughts on aspects of race and identity into six-word stories. She offered some moving stories and those of other participants. Here's an example offered by a foreign student with a heavy accent: "Language doesn't define who I am." It was a poignant plea for understanding that a person who may not be able to communicate well in English still has something important to share!

Norris says that recognizing silences within families is something that should give us pause. Not talking about it does not make it go away. Often it just grows, silently, until it is too big to contain. She said that her father, who grew up in Birmingham, Alabama, was shot by a white man, but he never spoke a word about the incident to his wife or children. He did not want them to feel fear in the present about something that had happened in the past. Yet, that event was a crucial part of his identity, and his family needed to know about it in order to understand him fully. Instead there was silence.

Norris talked about creating dialogue with family members and colleagues, but also with strangers. As human beings, we want to share our identities—who we are—with others. Doing so helps us to validate our own experiences. It helps us to build bridges of understanding. Dialogue keeps us from labeling people who are different from us as "others." This applies not just to race, but to every kind of difference: religion, class, disability, gender. We left with the challenge to distill some aspect of our own identity into six well-chosen words. Try it.

From the AAUW Annual Report

A survey of branches and states revealed that at least 150 AAUW branches in at least 35 states currently host programs related to women in science, technology, engineering, and math.

AAUW's presence on campus keeps growing. The number of AAUW student organizations more than doubled in 2013, and AAUW now counts more than 800 schools as college/university partner members.

The Archives Corps' research led to the discovery of a letter from Rachel Carson thanking AAUW for her 1956 Achievement Award and saying that she would use the funds to write her next book, which turned out to be the landmark environmental work *Silent Spring*.

More than 850 college women on 38 campuses completed *Elect Her-Campus Women Win* training to run for student government.

Lilly Ledbetter Hasn't Given Up on Fair Pay—and Neither Should We!

AAUW was proud to host Ledbetter's trip to Washington, D.C., for the fifth anniversary of her namesake law, the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. Ledbetter attended the State of the Union, met with 15 U.S. senators, answered questions before dozens of House Democrats, and spoke on a [call](#) with members of Congress and 16,000 activists.

She lobbied with AAUW and coalition partners to secure two new co-sponsors for the long-stalled [Paycheck Fairness Act](#). After meetings with Ledbetter, Sen. Tim Johnson (D-SD) and Sen. Jay Rockefeller (D-WV) signed on to the bill — leaving only a few Senate Democrats not on the bill.
