

TRAVELING WHILE BLACK

This virtual reality documentary is an eye-opening twenty minutes of what it is like to live Black in the United States. This brief documentary is the creation of a native Eastonian, Roger Ross Williams, whose direction puts you center stage as you experience what life was like for Black citizens who traveled within our country from about 1936-1966, the era of THE NEGRO MOTORIST GREEN BOOK. If you aren't familiar with "The Green Book," it was a directory of safe and welcoming places a negro citizen could stop to sleep, eat, or use the restroom when traveling. Although the book is not in use today, the documentary also helps the viewer understand and experience what is still happening today to our Black citizens as they drive or walk down a street. Welcoming ...

Recently an AAUW member shared that she had attended a different church as her church was not offering services that day. During the after services coffee, she found herself standing alone; no one came over to welcome her or to introduce themselves. She really didn't feel that she wanted join a group that felt that unfriendly.

Welcoming new people into a group can add to its overall diversity and strength. Who knows maybe that person is the alto your chorus needs or is well versed on California wines. Maybe you're looking to add new members or you might just be looking to expand your circle of friends. Whatever the setting, you can welcome new people by creating a friendly environment, inviting them to join you, and avoiding overwhelming or ignoring them.

Smile. Remember that first impressions are difficult to undo. A warm smile and friendliness and can make people feel more comfortable. Be approachable and open to talking to people. Make eye contact. Laugh easily.

Marsy's Law seeks to Amend the Pennsylvania Constitution to Provide Equal Rights for Crime Victims

While the accused and convicted have numerous rights in the Pennsylvania Constitution, crime victims only have statutory protections. Statutory rights are insufficient because victims have no recourse if their rights are violated. These rights include: the right to court notification, the right to be present at court proceedings, the right to read a victim impact statement and the right to timely restitution. Marsy's Law would give victims a voice in criminal justice proceedings, not a veto.

It's important to recognize that Marsy's Law is not a partisan issue. In fact, Marsy's Law passed unanimously in both the Pennsylvania House and Senate during the 2017-18 legislative session. In order for the initiative to appear on the November 2019 ballot, Marsy's Law must again pass in both chambers of the Pennsylvania General Assembly.
