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#### WHAT A BOOK FAIR — WHAT A TEAM — WHAT AN EFFORT — WHAT A SUCCESS !!!

As we put the 57<sup>th</sup> AAUW Book Fair "to bed", there are a few things we would like to share with the Branch.

We took a BIG, empty ice rink and turned it into a "Pop-Up" Used Book Store. See the Before and After pictures. But this can only happen with the time and talents of Branch members and community volunteers. The Book Fair Committee of 30 plus an additional 40 women and men volunteered for a total of 2500 hours. The community donated between 80,000 and 100,000 books with about 60,000 offered for sale.

All this work paid off; we had the best total sales ever....\$47,708. The majority of our income came during the first 3 full-price days. Our speculation is that there were fewer books to purchase the last 2 days, hence the lower sales

AAUW Bethlehem ended the "year" in fine style. On Wednesday, May 15, 2019, our branch awarded 23 high school scholars and one nontraditional student scholarships from our annual book fair. Over \$29,500 was presented that evening, bringing our unofficial total to \$754,000.00 since we started the awards in 1955.

We had a full house with moms and dads, spouses and siblings, and representatives from each of our high schools in attendance. And the young women did not disappoint. They are members of the National Honor Society, play in the band and sing in the choir. They are part of the fine theater companies and are varsity athletes. They volunteer at the soup kitchens, help out at summer camps, and many hold part time jobs to save for college. When they see a need, they do something about it. Here are just a few examples. Megan Forst, Freedom, and a student in Project Lead the Way (for students interested in engineering careers) and her partner are designing a stove top cover to prevent burns. Elisabeth Lee, Liberty, as a member of the Trail Tenders saw a need to do something about the ducklings that were getting caught in the fishing lines. They ended up devising a receptacle to dispose of the lines safely. Emma Sonnenblick, Freedom, started a summer program she named CAMP (Chester Acting and Movement Program) for underprivileged girls at an Easton Elementary school. Lauren Weintraub, Saucon Valley, volunteers in the NICU where she and twin brother spent the first four months of their lives. Now she provides encouragement to parents of other preemies. And Lina Perugini, Liberty, was the overall captain of mini Thon, a group of over 200 students from both high schools, who came together under her leadership to rise over \$140,000 this year for pediatric cancer. In addition, they volunteer at their churches, synagogues, and temples. And although the high schools require 60 hours of community service to graduate, these young women far surpass that. By the end of the first semester, they had accumulated more than 3800 hours and were still going strong. Special congratulations go to Grace Haas of Liberty HS who was awarded the Senior Women's Club of Bethlehem award. She will attend Syracuse University, majoring in Bio medical Engineering.

This wonderful evening is only possible through the efforts of many! Thanks to Bacchae for providing the delicious fruit trays and libations enjoyed by all, and the beautiful flower arrangements that decorated the tables. And thanks to the program VPs of Linda Robertson, Ginny Stanglein and Shirley Daluisio for providing the gorgeous and yummy cake that we all enjoyed and securing the social hall at Advent Moravian Church. It is a wonderful facility.

And thanks to the members of the scholarship committee for the countless hours they put. Thanks to Norma Ferguson, Barbara Janofsky, Myra Jones, Claire Ressler, and Louise Wisser. Great job ladies!! Our ability as an organization to provide these funds would not be possible without the hard work and dedication of all who worked so diligently to make the book fair a rousing success. Thanks to co-chairs Debbie Spinney and Rita Bergstrom and all of our AAUW members and community volunteers. #### A Few Facts about Pennsylvania's Prison Population

Did you know:

- the female prison population has increased in Pennsylvania by 28% from 2006 to 2016 while the male population increased by 10%
- 71% of that female population is imprisoned due to mental health problems
- 65% of 2016 PA prisoners overall, in the same time period, needed drug or alcohol treatment
- PA's older population is becoming imprisoned more and more mainly due to mental health and drug-related misuse

Pennsylvania's prisons and jails are filled with people who need the types of help that most prisons and jails don't provide and Pennsylvania's prisons and jails are filled with many people who are not a threat to their communities. Many citizen groups are urging our state government to look at new ways to help those people such as: eliminating cash bail, providing job training, mental health, drug rehabilitation programs and funding a public defense system. Pennsylvania is the ONLY state in the country that doesn't provide a public defender to a prisoner.

The facts show that if these programs were provided, rather than warehousing people in jails and prisons, the costs would be effective and our society would have more productive people reentering communities and a lower rate of recidivism.

#### <u>Crowd-source Funding for AAUW Initiatives</u> Isabela Madrigal, President, AAUW Lehigh Student Organization
