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AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund Challenges Sex Discrimination in Higher Education and the Workplace

AAUW-Bethlehem is honored to present Terry Fromson, Managing Attorney of the Women's Law Project (WLP), a Philadelphia public interest law firm engaged in high-impact litigation and public policy advocacy to advance the rights and status of women. Since joining the WLP in 1994, Ms. Fromson's priorities have included improving the criminal justice response to sexual and domestic violence, enforcing legal obligations of educational institutions to address sex discrimination in athletics and sexual harassment, and improving Philadelphia's institutional response to domestic and sexual violence.

She led a national effort to stop insurance companies from discriminating against victims of domestic violence, participated in a collaboration to implement the Family Violence Option in Pennsylvania to accommodate domestic violence victims receiving public assistance, helped change Pennsylvania law to provide victims of domestic violence a safe and confidential process to change their names, and participated in the creation of a unique sex crimes review to eliminate bias and improve police response to sex crimes.



Ms. Fromson is a principle author on several WLP publications relating to equity in athletics, elimination of institutional bias, insurance discrimination against victims of domestic violence, and access to justice for pro se litigants in Philadelphia Family Court.

Ms. Fromson will discuss her involvement in several AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) actions brought under Title IX, the federal law prohibiting sex discrimination in education.

Sex discrimination today takes a variety of forms: unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. LAF addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system to seek justice and change.

If you want to understand more about LAF and if you CARE about all forms of discrimination, this program will be an hour and a half well-spent. Please bring friends, neighbors and significant others.

In 1981, during an AAUW national convention, a program to support women seeking justice for gender discrimination was born. *That pilot program became the <u>Legal Advocacy Fund</u> (LAF).*Since then LAF has provided millions of dollars to balance the scales of justice for people working toward gender equity through the legal system.

We support brave plaintiffs seeking legal redress for <u>Title VII</u>, <u>Title IX</u>, <u>equal pay</u>, <u>sexual harassment</u>, <u>and tenure denial violations</u> and allocate \$100,000 annually to help fund landmark cases such as *Wal-Mart v*. *Dukes* and *Cioca v*. *Rumsfeld* as well as cases with the potential to set future precedents, such as *Rizo v*. *Fresno County Office of Education*.


Book Fair E-Sales Generate Scholarship Dollars

Last month a buyer to AAUW-Bethlehem's on-line sales paid \$90 for a copy (one of only two on the Internet).

Our April Book Fair is a much anticipated event and buyers look for terrific bargains. The 1,000+ books listed on AAUW's on-line Amazon account are not what our local buyers are seeking. On-line titles include: "Milch Cows and Dairy Farming – Comprising the Breeds, Breeding and Management, in Health and Disease of Dairy and Other Stock" (1896) for \$80 and the scintillating "Properties of Refractory" (1969) at \$24. This summer we sold a ten-volume set of Edgar Alan Poe (1904) for \$170.

As you consider weeding your own book shelves, please set aside old or unusual titles for our expert book evaluators. Annually, AAUW sells books on-line that generate at least two scholarship awards so it is a very important part of our Book Fair.
