

AAUW Student Affiliates Present What Does Menstruation Have To Do With It, Anyway?

February 18, 2020 ~ 4pm

We hear a lot about 'intersectionality' but what exactly does it mean? The dictionary states that intersectionality is the complex, cumulative way in which the effects of multiple forms of discrimination (such as racism, sexism, and classism) combine, overlap, or intersect especially in the experiences of marginalized individuals or groups.

Something as 'mundane' as menstruation - a topic that on the surfaces is simple and straightforward—is incredibly complex if you are a women is a less-developed or under-developed country or if you happen to be female and incarcerated here in the United States. Did you know that the equipment/products for simple hygiene are unavailable or difficult to access for many women who are incarcerated?

Do you know what a "pink tax" is?

It is a problem for many low-income women in the U.S.

The students AAUW at Moravian College and Lehigh University will share their studies, stories and knowledge about this not-so-simple topic on February 18in a meeting room in the HUB (Haupert Union Building) on the Main Campus. Refreshments provided.

The AAUW Book Fair attracts many folks from the surrounding and neighboring communities; last year's change to the Ice Rink brought us many favorable comments. We believe the new location allowed our buyers more room to browse and visit with each other; consequently they purchased more books. We need to continue the tradition of having a Book Fair that draws people from around the area and even out of state. We need to continue to

have materials in good condition and a set up that allows them to find that one book to complete their collection, or that one book for a child who's just learning to read, or that one book with the recipe they were looking for.

In order to do that, we need YOU to volunteer for sorting, set up and sales.

What is your commitment to Book Fair, 2020?

Of course, we want your used books, CDs and DVDs, but we are also in need of a few essentials during this process.

Last month we asked for weatherproof tarps for covering the tables and books in the ice rink. We will need enough to cover the 100+ tables in the Rink. They do not have to be new, but we found tarps (7' X 9') at Harbor Freight to be the correct size and price (\$2.99 with coupon found within their ads in most newspapers).

If you would like to be more involved with Book Fair beyond sorting and set up, we are in need of volunteers to work with current Section Chairs in their areas.

And finally, as you know the Book Fair needs many volunteer hours for sorting, set up and sales.

The Kick-Off Koffee on April 2nd at 10:00 signals the beginning of donations and sorting. The Koffee is in the Warming Room of the Ice Rink.

Sorting continues Monday-Saturday from 9 – noon, April 2nd – 22nd

Sales will need volunteers at various hours from April 23rd through April 27th

AAUW continues to influence legislation at the national and state level.

In December, the bipartisan <u>Building Blocks of STEM Act</u> was signed into law, with a little help from AAUW Lobby Corps. The legislation expands educational opportunities in math and science for young women and students of color. Thanks to Nevada Senator Jacky Rosen for championing the bill!

In late January ,AAUW CEO Kim Churches offered a webinar on 2020 Vision: The Gender Agenda.

It will cover our equity priorities for this year at the federal, state and local levels. You can watch it by going to aauw.org our National website.

State legislators have been making strides toward enacting equity laws. In all, 49 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico now have some form of equal-pay measure in place.

(Mississippi is the lone holdout.)

With the help of our members' advocacy, 11 states passed some form of fair-pay legislation, compared with six in 2018, 2017, 2016 and 2015. Of course, we need to keep pushing in 2020 to strengthen state and local laws.
