# Pennsylvania School Funding: The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

On Saturday, October 9, Michael Faccinetto, President of the BASD Board of School Directors, presented an "eye-opening" slide show to our members and the community on Fair Funding for PA Public Schools. Starting with the Constitutional Standard (Article III, Section 14) "The General Assembly shall provide for the maintenance and support of a thorough and efficient system of public education to serve the needs of the Commonwealth," he then went on to provide a history of school funding. He explained the basis of how our schools became so unfairly and poorly funded using a technique called "hold harmless."

# **Hold Harmless**

- In 1990 the state of Pennsylvania adopted a funding mechanism to ensure that no school district would receive less funding than it had the previous year. The mechanism, known as "hold harmless" was intended to prevent school districts with declining populations from falling into economic collapse.
- ➤ The school districts with declining enrollment have benefitted from the funding distortions caused by hold harmless. These districts have lost a total of 167,000 students since 1991-92 a fifth of their student body but they haven't lost any money, instead receiving increased funding each year. They now have \$590 million tied to students they no longer educate.

You can see from the slide that this funding mechanism meant to ensure that some declining school districts would not collapse, has instead caused severe underfunding for growing school districts in our state. Mr. Faccinetto highlighted the disparity in funding by using the Parkland and Allentown School Districts as an example. Living on a different side of the street means a very different school experience. PA school districts are underfunded by \$4.6 billion.

# How bad is it?

- ➤ Pa districts are underfunded by \$4.6 billion and those in the poorest school districts, who have fallen the furthest behind, are owed the most.
- Underfunding (per student):
  - o Reading \$8,500
  - o Allentown \$5.300
  - o Whitehall \$4,800
  - o Easton \$2,800
  - o Northampton \$1,600

#### A Woman in Blue: A Police Woman Speaks



In the early evening of September 29, members of AAUW-Bethlehem and AAUW-Easton met for a program arranged by our inter-branch Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging (DEI &B) group. Attended 21 members and 4 guests, the meeting was the first, in-person (but masked) program of this year for both branches. Therefore, the room at the Bethlehem Township Community Center quickly filled with the oh-so-long-wished-for sounds of many voices talking all at once before the program got officially underway.

On behalf of the Diversity Group, Susan McNamara welcomed all and by way of a non-introduction Introduction of our speaker asked all attendees to think for a few moments about their experiences with police and recounted a few of her own.

Selected by the Captain of the Bethlehem Township Police Department as our speaker, Officer Sarah Zielinski, came to us with his observation she could introduce herself "very capably." Therefore, she did...

and more. She took her audience through her journey from school and college years and beyond as she moved from thinking about-- and trying out various opportunities-- maybe chemistry, maybe forensics, maybe FBI, definitely not teaching--until she found her match as the only woman in training at the Allentown Police Academy. Yes, a woman who met all the

requirement and challenges of that experience went on to a couple of short-term assignments and is now in her third year with the Township Police, one of three women of the Department.

Addressing Q & A topics, her self-reflections were often humorous, her stories moving and responses candid. On the issue of covering Domestic Abuse situations, she described a formative experience of her early training: Going with a team to a home with an out-of-control child, immediately deciding to get on her knees on the floor, make eye contact and talk the child through to calming. Her mentor assured her that her instinctive action was right-on. In answer to the question of whether she felt respected by her peers and the public, she was quick to a "yes and no" answer. As a woman officer, not always by some peers and some members of the public. Yes, to overall experiences.

As if to prove the point that most public service professionals are never really "off duty," early into the Q &A portion of the program, Sarah unexpectedly interrupted her remarks to take a call and then announced that she was sorry but had to leave for a situation. Understanding, her audience, nonetheless, was also sorry. Many agreed afterwards that she would be a wonderful speaker and representative of police, especially women, for school programs. A terrific role model and civil servant.


# BOOK FAIR 2022 60th Book Fair Let's Break \$1 Million in Sales

For all our members, we hope you will join us in April for whatever amount of time you can give during Book


Fair set up and sales. Your time and talent is greatly ap-
