Chief Kott is an 18-year veteran of the City of Bethlehem Police Department. Prior to her appointment as Chief in 2020, she served as a patrol officer, detective, patrol sergeant, detective sergeant, detective lieutenant, and captain. In addition to these primary assignments, Chief Kott also served as a member of the department's Crisis Negotiation Team, and would later become the group's Team Leader.



Chief Kott is a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, as well as the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association.

Chief Kott holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice from DeSales University and a Master's degree in Criminal Justice from St. Joseph's University. In 2019 she received her Doctorate in Criminal Justice from California University of Pennsylvania and was the recipient of the Jay S. Albanese Award for Academic Excellence in Doctoral Criminal Justice Studies. Chief Kott is an adjunct instructor with Northampton Community College and resides in Bethlehem, PA with her wife and two children.

A Good First Step

It's the back-to-school gift so many needed. President Biden's announcement to forgive some debt for federal student loan recipients is welcome news addressing a core gender and racial equity issue. It will change the lives of millions.

But let's face it, it doesn't go far enough to fully support women and their families. This is especially true for Black women, as I share in the op-ed for the *Miami Herald*. I am so proud that AAUW has tirelessly advocated on this important issue for years.

In fact, the very same day as the president's announcement, AAUW released new research highlighting why action on student debt is desperately needed—and entirely aligned with our mission. The survey shows women of color are encountering the "perfect storm" of challenges repaying their loans, due to the combination of the racial wealth gap, gender and racial pay gaps, and economic instability caused by the pandemic.

So let's celebrate. But we must also keep working to ensure policy remedies serve those who need them most. That means advocating for even greater loan forgiveness, investing in the Pell Grant program, and improving income-based repayment.

Meanwhile, it's worth remembering that next steps can come only after you take that first one. Finally, we did!
