## *The September Program—Time Well Spent*

Bethlehem's first female police chief believes that all people need to be treated with respect. Michelle Kott spoke to about 25 AAUW-Bethlehem members at our September program and impressed every single one of us. She is dedicated to keeping all of the citizens of Bethlehem safe and believes that being pro-active with her officers in the community is an effective way to do that. Officers are scheduled to be out on the streets, in the neighborhoods, in the parks and on the playgrounds meeting adults and kids, developing positive relationships. These relationships lead to confidence when calling the police for help or with tips.

Chief Kott related her rise through the ranks in Bethlehem after interning here, and of the importance of having a thick skin, a clear head and a willingness to accept a helping hand from fellow officers. She wanted the men to see her working hard to be the best she could be and to serve the community well. She wanted them to feel confident in her abilities as a partner. She impressed them with her work ethic and with her willingness to accept any assignment. The Chief feels that women play an important role in police work because they are seen as less threatening than a male officer and because people are often more willing to talk with a woman in scary situations.

Chief Kott acknowledged that it has been difficult to recruit new police officers in today's political climate but she will only take those candidates who would be assets to the force rather than fill the ranks with those who might not be a solid choice. She would like more diversity to represent the minorities who live in Bethlehem. The force already has a small number of women and Hispanics as well as an Asian-American but more of each and more Blacks would be an improvement in community relations.

Attending this interactive lecture and question and answer session was definitely *Time Well Spent*. Those of us who live in Bethlehem can feel confident that our police department is on the right track as it is led by an intelligent, experienced, confident, knowledgeable, level-headed, female chief. Make a note to attend the next Branch Meeting. It will be **time well spent** thanks to the thoughtful planning of our Program Vice Presidents.

## **Public Policy** *ELECTION DAY is Fast Approaching*

Election Day is November 8<sup>th</sup>. This midterm election is so important for PA and the country. We have tight races for U.S. Senate, Congress, Governor, PA House and Senate seats. In most of these races the candidates are like night and day on where they stand on important issues. AAUW works tirelessly on issues that affect women and public education. The outcomes of this election will decide if we move forward and strengthen women's rights and public education or descend backwards 50 years. Let your voice be heard at the ballot box. Make sure your family and friends make a plan to vote!

Last spring SB106 (Senate Bill 106) was passed by the PA General Assembly. It contains constitutional amendments on abortion, Lieutenant Governor and election issues. AAUW PA along with the grassroots' organizations Fair District PA and Fix Harrisburg are asking candidates to complete a short survey on the issues included in the above bill.
