Student Affiliates Organizations

Student Affiliates Organizations at colleges and universities were a pilot program started over 20 years ago. National has discontinued this pilot program. College students at institutions that are a College/University partner with AAUW may join as a student at no cost. Students will continue to be invited to NCCWSL and scholarships are offered at the state and national level. Community grants are still offered to students and they may apply on the national website. The only change is any student run organization no longer has a national affiliation and may rebrand. Lehigh is not currently a paid C/U: this could be an oversight in billing or administration.

<u>DUES NEWS — ATTENTION ALL MEMBERS</u>

We have received a generous donation to fund the cost of mailed newsletters and will not be imposing an additional fee. Much thanks to the donor.

INCREASE:

The current dues amount for 23/24 fiscal year is \$98.00. The Executive Team reviewed the bylaws and determined an increase can be approved by 2/3 vote of the Executive Team and notifying the branch 60 days prior to implementation. Effective for next dues notice mailing in March, dues will be \$100. This includes the final 3 year increase by national and \$2 for the branch.

National will not ask for another increase for quite awhile as this most recent was substantial. State has not raised dues in over 25 years and branch dues have not increased in over 20 years.

Income, social security and pensions have all increased. We thought it appropriate timing. Please contact any member of the executive team with questions.

School Funding 101 and BASD Proud Parents

Monday February 13. 2023 7pm Zoom Presentation

Every child in Pennsylvania deserves robust course choices, class sizes that allow for personalized support, enough school counselors and nurses, and a safe learning environment so they can thrive and succeed in school today and live productive, fulfilling lives after graduation. But we don't provide students in every community with the support they need to reach their potential.

Unfortunately, Pennsylvania has one of the most inequitable school funding systems in America, ranking 43rd in the nation for state share of funding for K-12 education and with a funding gap that continues to grow. When the state share of funding is low, communities must rely on local wealth – property taxes – to fund their schools.

We need support for basic education funding as well as programs, such as "Level Up" which help the lowest 100 (out of 500) underfunded PA school districts. Allentown and Bethlehem are among them.

Our AAUW program will help you to understand the basics of how school funding works in PA. We will share about our district advocacy group, BASD Proud Parents: who we are, what we do, and how to get involved. You will also learn what you can do to make our school funding system better to ensure success for all students.

Public Policy – Collaborative Policymaking

There may be good news in Harrisburg soon. The courts have decided the three special house elections will be held Feb. 7th. They are all in traditional democratic districts in Alleghany County. So, it looks like the PA House will hold a slim democratic majority. This is good news ONLY if the democrats create new rules that support collaborative policymaking.

Fair Districts PA/Fix Harrisburg.com has long been championing the following 3 reasonable changes needed in the legislature:

Bills with demonstrated bipartisan support must be guaranteed a vote in committee.

Bills voted out of committee with bipartisan support must be guaranteed a vote on the chamber floor.

Bills passed in one chamber with bipartisan support should be given consideration in the other chamber.

PA ranks 46th of all the states in getting bills passed. 93% of the bills introduced during the PA General Assembly's 2021-22 legislative session were never scheduled for a final vote. Why? Most bills never reach the first step in being scheduled for a committee hearing. Even bills with strong bipartisan backing; Fair Charter School Funding, Carbon Monoxide Detectors in Day Care Centers, and Gift Ban Legislation never made it to a committee hearing. Yet, PA legislators rank 3rd highest in legislator salaries, \$95,000, behind only CA and NY. We are not getting our moneys worth! Hoping 2023 brings much needed changes in Harrisburg.

I will be writing about the following issues in future newsletters; bundling unrelated amendments to our state constitution and the importance of our court elections in the primary.

The Book Nook

It shouldn't come as a surprise to anyone that my husband, two daughters, and I are mystery book buffs. Having lived in England for a decade in the 70's and 80's, we have first hand experience of the locations of many a fictional murder, including many *Midsomer Murders*, shot in nearby Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire. So, when my daughter, Laura, told me I *had* to read Richard Osmond's 2020 debut novel, *The Thursday Murder Club*, I obtained a copy straight away. The four main characters are 80-year-old residents of Coopers Chase, a luxury retirement community in Kent. They meet every Thursday to solve cold-case murders. The various backgrounds of the friends lend to their sleuthing successes. Elizabeth is an ex-MI5 agent, Joyce is a diarist and Elizabeth's "Dr. Watson." Ibrahim is a retired psychiatrist. And Ron is an old trade union organizer, who provides a variety of useful, if shady, contacts. When there is a murder on the grounds of Coopers Chase, the foursome inevitably gets involved. The book is divided into short chapters of alternating perspectives, which keeps the tension building. I couldn't put it down! And I immediately borrowed Osmond's second and third novels when I visited Laura over the holidays: *The Bullet That Missed* and *The Man Who Died Twice*.
