Present at the Non-Profit collection were several folks who gather books for the prisons and prison ministry. One Section Chair collected books to take to the VA in Wilkes Barre.

Thank you for all your support during our Covid years, when we "dismantled" the Amazon store, sorted the books and took them to Fredrick, MD, housed and sorted the hundreds of books delivered to our homes in 2020 and 2021, and still interviewed and supported several women with scholarships. On Wednesday, May 10, 2023, our branch awarded \$40,000 in scholarships to 19 high school seniors. Moms, dads, grandparents, siblings, and representatives from the BASD came to the awards presentation held at Advent Moravian Church. We also had a wonderful turnout from our membership.

We had 12 recipients from Liberty High School and 7 from Freedom High school. They are all in the top 10% of their graduating class, have by the end of the 1st semester performed over 2800 hours of community service, and are the movers and shakers in their schools.



They sing in the choirs, play in the bands, and lead their sports teams. The best part is how generous of their time they are in helping others. They are stamping out racism, helping children with disabilities, mentoring the next generation, keeping cultural traditions alive and much, much more. Some of the gals are staying local (PA): Lehigh, Muhlenberg, Penn State, Pitt, Desales, Elizabethtown, King's, Carnegie Mellon, and St. Joe's, while others are heading to Delaware, Maryland, Mount Holyoke, U Mass-Amherst, and Fordham, And the young woman from FHS chosen to receive the Senior Women's Club of Bethlehem award is off to Rochester Institute of Technology.

These young women had a high school experience that was still very much affected by COVID, but they beat it! I know we will be in good hands when we "turn over the keys" to this generation.
