## Are You Biased?

I know I am. I have to work constantly on being aware that my decisions are not distorted when I interact with someone who is *different*. I was raised in Central Florida and have had to overcome the cultural biases that surrounded me into my late teens. One of these biases was that "everyone with a southern accent is uneducated." When I sat in my dorm room as a freshman at Emory University in Atlanta, I was surrounded by well-educated young ladies with southern accents. That bias was crushed on the spot by my personal experience.

This past year, I have had the necessity of spending much time in medical facilities, where staff is made up of men and women from many different cultural backgrounds. Each one had a nametag that enabled me to smile and thank them, using their name. Just taking the time to look at a nametag and acknowledge a doctor, nurse, aid or volunteer personally, made me feel a connection which overcame some of the bias I may have had toward those people who looked *different* to me.

If, like me, you find you have your own personal biases, try this experiment. The next time you have an interaction with someone wearing a nametag, use their name. Let me know what happens.

## General Election 2023

Many of you will soon be getting your Mail- in Ballots. Like I said last month, this election is very important as we will be electing state judges and many schoolboard members. Because candidates can cross file in the primary, the voter doesn't know if the person is a Democrat or a Republican. In years passed it didn't seem to matter. Judges were nonpartisan and schoolboard members were just concerned local citizens volunteer-



ing their time. Today these elections are very political. You really need to know what the judicial and school board candidate stands for. In the primary, the candidate is usually targeting a specific voter. So, the language on their website may contain a more extreme message. However, during the general election cycle the candidate must reach a much broader voting public so the candidate's website may contain language that is more centrist. This happened during the Senate hearings for Brett Kavanaugh and Amy Coney Barrett. When questioned by the Senate about their views on Roe v Wade, they said they stand by the laws of the land. Yet when they got on the bench, they overturned Roe vs Wade.

The election for PA Supreme Court looks to be very competitive. \$900,000 was spent on this primary alone. The candidates' websites have changed. During the primary, the language was more extreme. During this general election time, the language has been toned way down.

So how can you tell what the candidate really believes? How can you tell who is financing their election? Fact Check! Email your candidates' websites and ask specific questions. Talk to informed people. Politifact.com, Factcheck.org, and Propublica are quality sites. Spotlight PA is an independent, nonprofit and nonpartisan newsroom. Their articles often appear in the Morning Call. This is an excellent site specific for PA politics. To get all the articles written by their reporters, go to spotlightpa.org/newsletters. Women's reproductive rights, citizen's equal rights, public school funding and public school curriculums are being attacked. Contact me with questions about specific races. If I can't answer your question I know people who can. Stay informed, stay alert and by all means VOTE! *Joan Howe, Public Policy*

Here are two very interesting books which hopefully will be on the schedule for Paper-back I this season.

Running With Champions: A Midlife Journey on the Iditarod Trail, by Lisa Frederic. Lisa was an Alaskan Fisherwoman when, on vacation to Nome, Alaska, saw the burled-arch finish line for the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race. It changed her life. From volunteering during the race, she then volunteered for two winters with race champion Jeff King and his 80 sled dogs. From there she took a team of Jeff's younger dogs and drove the race herself. This a wonderfully written story about mid-life decisions, possibilities, and building confidence.

The Secret of Lost Things, a novel by Sheridan Hay. 18-year-old Rosemary arrives in New York City from Tasmania and gets a job at the Arcade bookstore. (This is a stand-in for The Strand.) Rosemary works with and gets to know an assortment of quirky characters. So many details about the store and the arrangements are fascinating. Eventually Rosemary gets involved in a mystery about a theoretically unknown manuscript by Herman Melville. There are connections to other institutions in New York. If you love books, literature, and bookstores, this one is great fun.
