HOT TOPICS JOINT STUDY GROUP WITH EASTON AAUW

We will meet on Wednesday, November 1st, at 1:00 pm at the Bethlehem Public Library, 11 Church St., Bethlehem.

We will be reporting on our Survey conversations at the Meeting. As we began to make phone calls to School Districts/Libraries, we quickly realized that some of the answers to our Survey Questions were being revealed quite publicly in daily news reports.

We have made suggested readings that sketch out for discussion a framework for a fuller understanding of book bans and beyond—process and players, outcomes and implications. Please contact Susan McNamara and she will email you the complete list.

Finally, we ask that we think not so much in political terms, although politics is certainly playing a role, but in terms of education (life long), curricula, access to library cards, library/school security and budgets.

"Moms for Liberty" groups are spreading across the country and causing havoc in school, libraries, and elections. Please pay attention. There are local candidates running for our school boards who do not have the best interests of ALL children on their minds.

Public Policy

I like using Mail In Ballots. They give me time to study the ballot and research any surprises. That was true again last week. On the back of my Northampton County ballot were two issues that I didn't know would be there. First, should three state level judges be reinstated for another 10 year term? At this level, judges do not run a reelection campaign. Voters decide if they should be reinstated. Not knowing anything about two of the judges, I had time to research them.

The other surprise issue was about Home Rule and term limits of Northampton County Executive, County Council and County Controller. I researched Home Rule and learned it is granted by state constitution and gives some autonomy to a local government. It implies that each level of government has a separate realm of authority. I used a website Linda Robertson told me about, armchairlehighvalley.substack.com to research the Term Limit question.

This website is run by two former longtime *Morning Call* journalists. Chris Borick, director of the Muhlenberg College Institute of Public Opinion was interviewed and did a fine job discussing the pros and cons of Term Limits. Making changes to a county charter, or a state constitution, should not be taken lightly. There is a reason these documents were written that way. Ask yourself, who wants it changed and why? Afterall, isn't that why we have elections? Voters can decide who is in and who is out on Election Day. I encourage all of you to check out Armchair Lehigh Valley when it comes to researching local elections. Remember to VOTE on Nov. 7, 2023!

Two giraffes miraculously survive a hurricane crossing the Atlantic Ocean. They are housed in a custom trailer with a plan to drive them across the country to the San Diego Zoo. Woodrow is a 17-year old orphan who traveled from Texas to live with a distant relative, only to find him mean and abusive. He sees the giraffes and manages to follow them, ultimately being hired as their driver. Meanwhile, Woody falls in love with a young female reporter who follows the giraffes.
