Here are some things to consider when making your decision regarding the Motion to reallocate Book Fair revenue so that no funds go to National AAUW. We will have a discussion of pros and cons at our special meeting on March 9 at 1:00pm. Everyone will have a chance to present the pros and cons of the issue at the meeting, but I would like to remind Branch members of certain important facts.

Our Mission: AAUW advances gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy. We are the nation's leading voice promoting equity and education for women and girls.

What does AAUW do for us?

- 1. The National Organization offers fellowships and grants for advanced research and degrees; Work Smart, Start Smart, and Money Start Smart programs; Leadership programs; and STEM programs.
- 2. The National Website offers programming ideas' access to other branch information, websites, and newsletters; discussion of public policy issues and research; and a HELP center.
- 3. National goals for this year include shrinking gender pay gaps, championing equal access in education, with continued focus on Title IX, and the expansion of the number of women in leadership.
- 4. National's strong Public Policy Team promotes awareness of issues and actions, maintains an effective Lobby Corps, and generates the 2-Minute Activist.

Our contributions to National AAUW assure its continuation. If it ceases to exist, so do we! And so does our Book Fair. Study Groups may continue, as long as they do not use the name AAUW. If we make no branch contribution, we will not be able to recognize any individual members as our annual *Named Gift Honoree*.

HOT TOPICS: BOOK BANS AND MORE: HOW CAN WE HELP?

The Hot Topics group met on November 1, 2023 at the Bethlehem Area Public Library. Our review of the survey information gathered on book banning in our local communities and beyond moved to a discussion of issues underlying the rise in challenges to libraries and schools not only about books but also curriculum, LGBT polices, board policies and procedures. Among the factors raised were the role of established organizational networks and offshoots such as Moms4Liberty, White Christian Nationalism, opposition to public schools, funding for schools and libraries, and partisan politics. It was agreed that we would work on a plan of action to aid school and public libraries in mitigating the impacts of book bans and censorship in PreK-12 education.

Getting off to a quick start, AAUW Easton and AAUW Bethlehem members met on Thursday, November 16th with directors/staff from local libraries to talk about the challenges, brainstorm ideas, identify resources, and make connections. Hosted by the Easton Area Public Library at the invitation of its director, Jennifer Long, the exchange of perspectives, insights, and resources on a range of issues from library policies and procedures, public library and school library relations, the role of librarian in the community, library funding, public understanding of the role of a public library and challenges faced was stimulating! The group closed the dialogue with a proposal to create "Allyships" between AAUW members and the libraries and agreed to move forward with the development of "matches-ups" and ideas for fostering and enabling these relationships.

We know that such a project can be potentially a large undertaking whose success lies in the presence of many hands. At this time then, we will be engaged with ally building and are looking to assess interest in participation from Bethlehem and Easton branch members. In short, if this "hot topic" concerns you, if you want to help-- in communications, networking, ally building, news tracking, strategic planning come join us and others such as the Stop Moms for Liberty, BASD Proud Parents, our state senators and representatives, media outlets (social and news organizations) as well as partners in schools and libraries themselves.

One of the books Paperback I read for November was *Hear My Voice* by Marcia Rudin. It is about the rise of women in leadership positions in American religion. It followed three women, a Catholic Nun who dreamed of being a priest, a young Jewish woman who dreamed of being a rabbi, and a young Presbyterian woman who dreamed of being a minister. In this book the historical details are very precise. The characterization of the three women and others in the book, however, seemed a bit weak.

Coincidentally the dog-lover in our book group finished *Hear My Voice* and began to read *The Other Family Doctor* by Karen Fine, DVM. Although Karen began veterinary school in 1990, there was still a lot of prejudice against women veterinary students. This has changed, as the majority of veterinary students are now women. The dog-lover's much appreciated veterinary practice is all women. This book is filled with wisdom and humor: a delightful read!

After tasting these two wines, Fran surprised us with a bottle of a liqueur that was given to her. It was a liqueur made by Carthusian monks since 1737, and the recipe was supposedly a recipe for an "elixir of long life". After taking a sip, everyone agreed that it wasn't pleasant at all, but instead was sticky, syrupy, and tasted like cough medicine! At least the wines were good.
