LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The following is a letter that was sent to the Morning Call

Thank you to Michelle Kott, Chief of Police Bethlehem, for the informative program recently hosted by the AAUW Bethlehem Branch with invited guests from Moravian Village. Her presentation, "Bethlehem Police Department Today," provided valuable insights into the work, dedication, and efforts of our local police force in addressing and preventing crime. Chief Kott shared her journey from studying criminology to serving as a patrol officer, detective, patrol sergeant, detective sergeant, lieutenant, captain, and attaining a Doctorate in Criminal Justice in 2019. She was appointed Bethlehem Chief of Police in 2020. I learned that only 3% of law enforcement chiefs in the US are women, according to the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

The presentation highlighted the importance of building positive relationships with law enforcement. We learned that many schools and communities in Bethlehem now have assigned resource officers trained to address issues before they escalate. This proactive approach focuses on prevention rather than solely reacting to crime. The mounted police force now has six horses, two full-time mounted officers, and additional field riders, which has been a positive intervention at many local events. The Crisis Negotiation Team and a focus on our local officers' well-being and mental health have been valued additions.

After her presentation, there was a question-and-answer period that highlighted the interest of all attendees in the work our local police are doing in Bethlehem. We left the event with a renewed appreciation for the work of our local police force and a clear determination to express our gratitude to them.

Public Policy: PA HOUSE CANDIDATES

Public Policy Study Group researched all the Lehigh Valley candidates running for PA State House Representative and their stand on Women's Reproductive Rights. The information was taken from their websites or from PA Choice Tracker (a website that details lawmaker's voting record).

- District 22 **D** Josh Siegel, unopposed: Pro-choice champion. Sponsored HB 2465, 2463, 2219 that protect women's reproductive rights.
- District 131 **D** Meriam Sabih: Pro-choice. Protect women's rights. Endorsed by Planned Parenthood.
 - **R** Milou Mackenzie, incumbent: Anti-choice. Right to life is an unalienable right that is protected by the Constitution. She feels the PA law will not change.
- District 132 **D** Mike Schlossberg, unopposed: Pro-choice. He condemns the Dobbs Decision.
- District 133 **D** Jeanne McNeill, unopposed: Pro-choice champion. Sponsored bill that prohibits PA from cooperating with any other state's abortion investigation.
- District 134 **D** Peter Schweyer, unopposed: Pro-choice. He will stand up for women seeking abortion care and will defend and fight for that fundamental freedom.
- District 135 **D** Steve Samuelson, unopposed: Pro-choice. He is a consistent supporter of efforts to protect abortion rights and expand access to reproductive healthcare.
- District 136 **D** Bob Freeman, unopposed: Pro-choice champion. Sponsored HB 800, 802, 2915 that protect Woman's Reproductive Rights.
- District 137 **D** Anna Thomas: Pro-choice. Defends access to abortion and family planning resources. Family planning should be made by families not politicians. **R** Joe Emrick, incumbent: Anti-choice. Prohibit all abortions. Voted to amend PA Constitution to exclude any abortion rights.
- District 138 **D** Jared Bitting: Pro-choice. Believes that women, not politicians or government, should have the freedom to make their own decisions about pregnancy.
 - **R** Ann Flood, incumbent: Anti-choice. Sponsored bill to amend the PA Constitution to exclude any abortion rights. PA will protect every unborn child, from conception to birth.
 - District 183 **D** Joe Lenzi: Pro-choice. Supports codifying Roe into PA Constitution to protect reproductive freedom. Women have freedom over their own bodies. **R** Zach Mako, incumbent: Anti-choice. Voted to amend PA Constitution to exclude any rights relating to abortion.
- District 187 **D** Stefanie Rafes: Pro-choice. Women have the right to control their own bodies, and the right to decide when and how to start a family.
 - **R** Ryan Mackenzie, incumbent: Voted for a bill that bans abortions after 14 weeks except for cases with an irreversible health risk to the pregnant person.

October 21st is the voter registration deadline.

Make sure family, neighbors and friends are all registered!
